President's Annual Report (20 Sept 2018)

FoM currently has a membership of 128 (Wildcare webpage).

We are fortunate to have an active membership comprising volunteers with diverse and useful skills.

Museum

The Deny King Heritage Museum, our big project over the past 3 years, is now complete, with the final two interpretation panels added in January plus an introductory panel on the outside wall. A large illustration depicting the diversity of life in the local moorland habitat, printing was sponsored by Roaring 40s Kayaking. A panel in the entry area acknowledges the Needwonnee people and directs visitors to the Needwonnee walk. Also in the porch we installed a huon pine plank with a routed quote: "Those who drink the buttongrass water always return", set off with a sprig of buttongrass. We have also installed a collection of reference books in the museum. Producing a set of information folders is ongoing, the first ones about fauna are now in the museum, thanks Mick Statham. Extra signage outside and the pick and shovel display on the outside of the entry wall added during the working bee help to make the building look more interesting. Panels are holding up well; a little scratching on those under the windows, so we may have to look at re-printing these every so often. And there is more to do of course — such as digitising the catalogue of objects on display.

Meetings

FoM held three general meetings at DSS over the past year. At the September meeting following the 2017 AGM, Rob Banfield gave a presentation about volunteering at the Quarantine Station at Bruny Island. Great to hear what some of our fellow Wildcare Groups are achieving and how they address different problems. Mick presented the Gwladys Morris album, a copy of an album in the State Library of Victoria (made by Critchely Parker's mother's companion Gwladys Morris) about their visits to Port Davey in the 1940s.

At the May meeting we had a wrap-up of the March working bee. At the July meeting Tony Fenton gave a presentation about a new book *Mapping van Diemens Land and the Great Beyond: rare and beautiful maps from the Royal Society of Tasmnaia*. Tony Fenton and Peter Marmion were invited to write a chapter about the maps in the collection that depict west and south-west Tasmania.

On 9 November 2017 several FoM members attended a Wildcare function at Woodvine Reserve to mark the handover of Trauti Reynolds albums to the Tasmanian Archives and Heritage Office.

FoM is a member of the Maritime Heritage Organisations of Tasmnaia. A MHOoT conference was held at Swansea May 23rd. Organized by John Wadsley, MMT, 50 museum delegates from around the state attended. Erika gave a brief report of this interesting gathering.

Erika and Janet attended a Wildcare website training day at Rosny Library on 4 August.

FoM meets with PWS both formally and informally and we appreciate the great relationship that we have with Ian Marmion, Pip Gowen and Peter Rigozzi, Alan Thurston and Brett Knowles.

Working bee
