The following motions will be put to the Special General Meeting —

MOTION 1 — It is proposed that all mention of "Parks and Wildlife Service" be altered to *Reserve* Management (PWS and other public land managers), nature conservation and cultural heritage conservation (on and off reserve).

Explanation — This alteration reflects the new structure of the Dept of Primary Industries, Water & Environment that places nature conservation and cultural heritage branches in the Resource Management & Conservation Division, outside the Parks & Wildlife Service. It also acknowledges that nature conservation and cultural heritage conservation work may occur off reserve.

MOTION 2 — Insert the following alterations to Section 2 of the Constitution.

Explanation — The entire Section 2 in included below with the relevant clauses highlighted in a box and the

additional words in bold. These alterations are necessary to demonstrate that *WILDCARE* is not a conduit for money meant for purposes other than *WILDCARE* business. Insertion of the words will enable *WILDCARE* to apply for tax deductable status for donations.

Powers

- 2. (1) In carrying out the objects the Association shall have the following powers, namely:
- (a) the purchase, taking on lease, licence or in exchange, and the hiring or otherwise acquiring of any real or personal property that may be deemed necessary or convenient for any of the objects or purposes of the Association;
- (b) the buying, selling, and supplying of, and dealing in, goods of all kinds;
- (c) the construction, maintenance, and alteration of buildings or works necessary or convenient for any of the objects or purposes of the Association;

(d) the accepting, or declining, of any funds, subscriptions, donations of real and personal property and gifts, whether subject to a will, special trust or not, for any one or more of the objects or purposes of the Association. The Board will not receive any gifts of money or property other than for the objects and purposes of the Association.

- (e) the taking of such steps from time to time as the Board of Management may deem expedient for the purpose of procuring contributions to the funds of the Association, whether by way of donations, subscriptions, or otherwise;
- (f) the printing and publishing of such newspapers, periodicals, books, leaflets, or other documents as the Board of Management may think desirable for the promotion of the objects and purposes of the Association;
- (g) the borrowing and raising of money in such manner and on such terms as the Board of Management may think fit or as may be approved or directed by resolution passed at a general meeting;
- (h) the investment of any moneys of the Association not immediately required for any of its objects or

- (i) the making of gifts, subscriptions, or donations to any of the funds, authorities, or institutions which have similar objects to the Association. In the exercise of this power, WILDCARE will not act as a mere conduit for the donation of money or property to other organisations, bodies or persons;
- (j) the establishment and support, or aiding in the establishment and support, of foundations. institutions, funds, trusts, schemes, and conveniences calculated to benefit servants or past servants of and the Association their dependants, and the granting of pensions, allowances, or other benefits to servants or past servants of the Association and their dependants, and the making of payments towards insurance in relation to any of those purposes;
- (k) the establishment and support, or aiding in the establishment or support, of any other foundation or trust formed for any of the basic objects of the Association;
- the purchase or acquisition, and undertaking, of all or any part of the property, assets, liabilities, and engagements of any foundation with which the Association may at any time become amalgamated in accordance with the provisions of the Act and the Rules of the Association;
- (m)to employ such officers and servants as the Board of Management may deem necessary and to pay such remuneration or bonus as the Board of Management may determine as reasonable and proper; and
- (n) the doing of all such other lawful things as are incidental or conducive to the attainment of the objects of the Association or of any of the powers specified in the foregoing provisions of this subrule.
- (o) The Board must comply with any rules that the Treasurer of the Commonwealth of Australia and
- (p) the Minister for Environment, Sport and Territories make to ensure that gifts made to the Trust be used
- (q) only for the purposes specified in this document.

Rewards for long term commitment

WILDCARE, in cooperation with PWS Field Centres, have purchased a number of sleeveless Polar Fleeces as reward and recognition for members who provide a large number of volunteer hours to specified projects.

The jackets are embroidered with the words "*WILDCARE* Inc Caring for Wild Places" followed by the specific location for the project (eg Maatsuyker Island, Overland Track, and Tamar Island).

Eligible projects are selected in consultation between *WILDCARE* Inc and field centres/project leaders as *WILDCARE* and the field centre/project leader share the costs of the jackets. The conditions associated with the issue of the jackets are:

Conditions

- Must be a *WILDCARE* member when undertaking the volunteer work.
- Rangers or DPIWE staff responsible for the project must validate participation.
- Jacket carries no Authority and cannot be used as a means of enforcement.
- The jacket cannot be used as identification in lieu of a *WILDCARE* pass if claiming discounts available through *WILDCARE*.

Eligibility

200 hours (or written commitment for at least a 12-month period) accrued as part of an eligible and officially adopted *WILDCARE*/PWS program. For example, the eligible programs formally adopted at present are:

- Volunteer Track Wardens Waterfall Valley
- Maatsuyker Island Volunteer Caretaker program
- Deal Island Caretaker Program
- Adopt-a-Track Program (Caretakers who have signed a 12

month agreement and completed the first 6 months)

- Tamar Island Wetland Centre (Information Volunteers working on a roster basis)
- *WILDCARE* Office assistance (volunteers working on a long term roster basis)
- Other projects may be added as a result of consultation between *WILDCARE* and Rangers/other DPIWE staff.

We should be seeing jacket-wearing members all over the place soon, as the above projects have to date involved 250 members!

A limited number if jackets with the words "*WILDCARE* Inc — Caring for natural and cultural heritage" **are available for sale at \$40**. Tools put to work on the West Coast!

In the December 2001 issue of WILDTIMES, there was an article on the successful application submitted by WILDCARE Inc for the International Year of the Volunteer Small Grants Program. The application was for purchase of tools for coastal management projects on the West Coast of Tasmania. Below is an article by Krissy Ward, Ranger PWS Strahan, who is working with volunteers on these projects.

Future WILDCARE working bees along Tasmania's West Coast will be made a little easier with the provision of over \$700 worth of hand tools. The tools, kindly sponsored by Commonwealth funds, are to be made available to all groups within the Parks and Wildlife Service Western District — Strahan field centre.

The tools were recently put to some hard work on the tracks between Granville Harbour and the Pieman Heads. Coastal rehabilitation and stabilisation of tracks has involved more than 20 people travelling as far




as Launceston to be involved. The working bees involved placing cross drains to direct water off the track, reducing erosion in creek crossings and draining deep water holes.

Report on the Mountain Orchestra-WILDCARE Performance Project

Printed in September 2001 WILDTIMES newsletter (issue 11) was an invitation for members to participate in this Project. The following article is a report on what has been happening with the Project to date.

The instrument-making workshops for the exciting new Mountain Orchestra are now completed. Several *WILDCARE* members joined existing Mountain Orchestra members and made a number of innovative new instruments. The workshops were held at Strato Anagnostis' Kaleidoscope Factory at beautiful Bream Creek during January 2002. Strato would be well known to *WILDCARE* members, as he was a member of the South American band Arauco Libre that played at the WildEdge Music Festival in Strahan in August 2000. Strato, together with musician and instrument-repairer Julian Bush, led the workshops and taught participants some of the basic principles involved in making musical instruments.

Workshop participants concentrated on making a new horn section for the Orchestra. Several horns ranging in size from a handy 700 mm to a whopping 5.5 metre alpenhorn were constructed. The first workshop was devoted to making the basic horn shapes. In the second (very noisy) workshop we tested the instruments to

ADOPT-A-TRACK NEWS

An issue of track degradation...

In January this year, I had the fantastic opportunity of walking the Western Arthurs. Those of you who have also had this opportunity, will understand the enormity of the "trek" and the shear splendour of the surrounds. My walking companion had already walked the Arthurs a number of times, but some 20 years prior.

One of the things which stood out for both of us was that in some areas especially at the western end — the increasing number of people visiting this area really showed, in the form of track degradation.

To varying levels, track degradation is apparent on many tracks throughout the State. One way to slow up, if not to prevent degradation, is the continual ongoing maintenance of tracks.

Track maintenance can take many forms including checking drains, keeping them clear of silt build up and/or leaves and sticks.

Maintenance can also take the form of checking a track from time to time to ensure fallen trees are not blocking the path, causing walkers to go around the obstacle and creating another "braid". Annual, selective pruning on the top side of a track can also assist in walkers sticking to the track and not walking on the edge, which could cause the track to give way at the edges.

Track issues in Tasmania require long term strategies to reduce and reverse degradation. For the most part though, a lot of our walking tracks will be



Background

Ricegrass (Spartina anglica) is a serious threat to not only the natural biodiversity of the Port Sorell estuary, but to the recreational, aesthetic and tourist potential of the region including Narawntapu National Park. With the problem growing exponentially and seedlings continuously re-emerging at Port Sorell, Squeaking Point and the Panatana rivulet, effective action is necessary now, and time is of the essence.

Management of the estuary is shared between Latrobe Council, Tasmanian Parks & Wildlife Service and Forestry Tasmania. A cooperative approach is obviously necessary to work towards the total eradication of this invasive weed.

The State Rice grass Management Strategy is now firmly in place and working successfully in Bridport, the Derwent River, Little Swanport and Smithton. Local regional communities are at last making a commitment to ongoing control.

Following a successful spraying program last year by the State Management team, a public meeting was held in Port Sorell in December, and it was agreed that the ricegrass free area north of Eagle Point should be extended southwards from Squeaking Point boat ramp to the end of Spaldings Lane. It is intended to spray several large clumps in this region in March 2002. Volunteers will be required to monitor and remove seedlings. Removing and controlling **Rice grass from Squeaking Point is** now a reality that can be achieved within the next two years.

Last year, a total of 80 volunteers contributing labour over two days removing a substantial number of seedlings.

The project is a co-operative effort involving the Rice Grass Management group, Parks and Wildlife Service, Forestry, Landcare groups and *WILDCARE* members.

Overland Hut Wardens: Volunteer on track to help bushwalkers

As offices go, it's not bad.

Where Jeram Cowley, 19, of New Norfolk, goes to work each morning, there's no traffic, no telephones, no fax and no memos.

His place of work is Waterfall Valley hut, the first hut on the renowned Overland Track in the Cradle Mountain–Lake St Clair National Park.

Mr Cowley is one of seven volunteers, aged from 19 to 70, who are taking part in the Parks and Wildlife Service's track warden programme. Each volunteer spends seven to 14 days at the hut assisting and advising bushwalkers. He became involved in the project because he was interested in a career with the Parks and Wildlife Service.

The track warden project is part of the WILDCARE programme, which utilises volunteers for environment projects all over Tasmania.

Other projects are adopt-a-track and monitoring the orange-bellied parrot at Birch's Inlet in the South-West.

Scheme coordinator and ranger Kathy Van Dullemen said the majority of volunteer track wardens were retired. She said their major task was to

manage the inexperienced bushwalkers who made up nearly half of the 8000 who walked the Overland Track every year.

They greet the walkers, show them the facilities, explain hut etiquette, explain about minimal impact bushwalking and encourage people to turn back if they are poorly equipped. She said Waterfall Valley was the obvious location to begin the programme. "It is the first day, the biggest and hardest day including a big climb up over Marions Lookout, which is very exposed," she said. Funding is available to extend the programme to Pelion hut at the halfway point but volunteers are needed. The only requirements are that

volunteers have a basic first aid certificate and have walked the Overland Track.

Their most valuable asset is patience, Miss Van Dullemen says.

She said volunteers were usually highly motivated people who wanted to be involved with the park. "They want to help people experience the area and pass on their knowledge and experience," she said.
